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Innovative diagnostic tool, expert reflux team

On the technology front, the use of confocal laser endomicroscopy is one of the services that sets the Minnesota Reflux and Heartburn Center (MRHC) apart. Since the installation of Cellvizio, the world's smallest microscope, at both Riverwood and CRMC in 2015, reflux specialists can now look inside human cells to diagnose pre-cancerous--Barrett's esophagus--or cancerous conditions.

"What this means for patients is that we can diagnose Barrett's esophagus or esophageal cancer immediately during an endoscopy," explains Dr. Timothy LeMieur, MRHC reflux specialist. "At this time, Cellvisio is being used in only a few specialized centers in the U.S., so being able to offer this innovative technology here is a huge benefit for reflux patients."

Patients benefit from expert care for reflux, heartburn

"At first I had mild heartburn, then it developed into something much worse," Hannafin explains. "I started to wake up from the stomach acid refluxing. I experienced chest pain that radiated up from my shoulders into my jaw; at one point it got

so bad that I had to go to the ER. When food began to get caught in my esophagus, I became very concerned."

Hannafin went to see her primary care provider who referred her to a reflux specialist at the Minnesota Reflux and Heartburn Center. He performed an endoscopy with Bravo monitoring that revealed Hannafin's esophageal acid levels to be quite high.

A biopsy showed that Hannafin has Barrett's esophagus, a precancerous condition that may potentially lead to esophageal cancer. In December 2015, she underwent radiofrequency ablation of the esophagus to remove precancerous cells.

Hannafin is now taking omeprazole, a prescription medication that effectively decreases the amount of esophageal acid the body produces. But she's planning on having surgery to reinforce the lower esophageal sphincter, which would eliminate the need for taking medication ongoing.

"With the progression of my GERD symptoms, including frequent sleep disruption, I was feeling miserable. Now I'm doing so much better. I'm so grateful for what has been done to treat my reflux disease so far."



Steven Ladd, Palisade

Steven Ladd, age 59, was diagnosed with gastroesophageal reflux disease after he began spitting up blood, sought emergency care and was hospitalized.

"Twenty-some years ago a coworker on a roofing job mentioned that I was taking a lot of anti-acid tablets and mentioned reflux disease, but I didn't think anything of it," Ladd says. "I just kept taking Tums and Rolaids and experienced many years of upset stomach, heartburn and indigestion before I got relief."

Ladd was referred for an endoscopy with a reflux specialist at the Minnesota Reflux and Heartburn Center, where he was diagnosed with a precancerous reflux condition called Barrett's esophagus. Over the last two years, Ladd has undergone a series of ablations to destroy pre-cancerous cells in his esophagus in an effort to prevent the progression of reflux disease to esophageal cancer.

Ladd, who retired from construction work a few years ago due to health reasons, has congestive heart failure with a defibrillator implant and takes a blood thinner. While these factors add to the complexity of his reflux care, he's been impressed with how the MRHC team has made accommodations to make the endoscopy and ablation procedures go smoothly for him.

"Right now I have no chest pain and am able to enjoy my diet without too many restrictions," Ladd adds. "I greatly appreciate the comprehensive care I've received for my acid reflux."

Three ways to sign up for a MyChart account:


- **1. In person:** Our clinic registration staff can give you an activation code to register for a MyChart account and has paper copies of the sign-up form and the adult and child proxy forms.
- **2. Online:** If you have a current, valid email address on record with Riverwood, go to www.mychartweb.com and click on "sign up now" to complete the MyChart online registration form.
- 3. By fax or mail: Go to www.mychartweb.com to download and print a sign up form to complete and fax or mail.

Solutions to hip and knee pain

Below are answers to common questions for those with hip or knee pain caused by osteoarthritis. They reflect information shared by Adam English, Orthopaedic Total Joint Coordinator and Nurse Practitioner for Minnesota Center for Orthopaedics (MCO) in Aitkin and Crosby, at a recent seminar.

Q: What is the difference between steroid vs. gel-based injections for knee pain?

A: Steroids are usually given to patients if knee pain is quite severe at the time of a clinic visit as they work to decrease inflammation. The optimal time for relief is 7 to 10 days, with many patients better in the first week. Gel injections are given to patients when their arthritis is not as severe. They simply provide lubrication to the joint—like 10W40 oil to the knee.

Q: How can you tell if pain is coming from the hip or the back?

A: Back pain usually presents itself as a burning "zinger" like pain that can go into the feet. This could also present as leg weakness. Hip pain is usually groin and buttocks pain that does not radiate past the knee. Injections into the joints can help differentiate between back and hip pain.

Q: Where can you go to find out a score for knee joint pain?

A: Go to http://www.orthopaedicscore.com/ scorepages/oxford_knee_score.html to complete a 12-point questionnaire that will give you a score for knee arthritis. Typically, surgical intervention is needed for those who score 19 or lower
